CBS to conduct survey of real estate sector

The Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) is preparing to conduct a 'real estate survey' for the first time in a bid to trace the real picture of the sector and its contribution to the national economy from the beginning of fiscal year 2076/2077. As part of the survey, CBS will collect necessary details from agencies and land and housing business. It should provide a guideline for policymakers. CBS officials said that the outcome of the survey will be crucial to trace the role and impact of the sector in the national economy. The survey will collect the number of employment opportunities that the sector has been giving, the impact (positive and negative) that the sector has been making in the gross domestic product (GDP) and the volume of land and housing transactions made every year, among others. It can guide the government to manage scientific human settlements and land.
